### **Annual Report**

### 2018-2019 National Council of Jewish Women Greater Dallas Section Annual Report

I was struck by the following passage in Michelle Obama's book "Becoming". I reread it several times, thinking it so describes NCJW Dallas.

"It's all a process, steps along a path. Becoming requires equal parts patience and rigor. Becoming is never giving up on the idea that there's more growing to be done."

I stand in awe, with great regularity, as I watch what the women of NCJW Dallas accomplish with rigor, patience, never giving up and always finding ways to grow.

### Administration:

### Vice-Presidents: Extraordinary pair Carol Alkek and Stacy Barnett

The 106th Birthday Luncheon was an Overwhelming Success. Mayor Mike Rawlings, when presenting the Pioneering Partner award to City of Dallas Welcoming Communities and Immigrant Affairs to Liz Cedillo-Pereira, the director of WCIA, stated how proud and grateful he is of NCJW and its impact on the greater Dallas Community. In fact, NCJW planted the seed for WCIA. Ms. Cedillo-Pereira's acceptance speech continued the theme of what women can do with hard work and determination regardless of background. The icing on the cake was the keynote speaker Ellen Goodman. Ms. Goodman spoke about the times we are in now, and how compassion and empathy will result in both men and women being treated equally in the work place and beyond. This would create an environment where civility abides and we can do justice and repair the world. This luncheon, besides being a wonderful community event, is our major fundraiser, and funds we did raise. The luncheon raised, with the help of the Wolens Foundation Match, approximately 800 attendees and a huge cadre of volunteers, a little over \$500,000.

Under the direction of our V.P.'s our Public Affairs Program has distinctly and superbly enabled education and actively demonstrated commitment to our engagement in our city.

Over 100 people attended our Opening Meeting at Temple Emanu-El. How fortunate our community is to have wonderful experts to educate us about the dangers of **Domestic Abusers Owning Guns.** The panel of experts included: **Judge Roberto Canas, Jennifer Staubach Gates, Jan Langbein** moderated by **Natalie Nanasi.** Mosaic Family Services and Moms Demand Action were community partners for this event. Thank you Hadassah and Jackie.

We held a **Meet and Greet for Our Newly Elected Officials** who were out in full force and generously gave their time to NCJW. We are especially fortunate to have a partner and sponsor like **Frost Bank**, who provided the space, and all the amenities for the evening's event. A wonderful cooperative NCJW spirit made this happen.

We have begun to learn about the Food Desert issues in our city. Our Winter Meeting "For the Love of Food: How Food Transforms Communities chaired by Randi Smerud, was held at

Café Momentum. The capacity crowd demonstrated our concerns and commitment to our community. Speakers **Chad Houser (creator of Cafe Momentum), Daron Babcock (CEO and founder of Bonton Farms)** and **Anga Sanders of Feed Oak Cliff,** shared the dire situation of the lack of access to fresh food plaguing South Dallas.

We continued our learning with Our Spring Meeting at Bonton Farms. We toured the farm and were treated to a wonderful lunch at the Bonton Farm Café. Daron Babcock was our teacher for the day. What a difference they are making in this community. Once again hats off to Hadassah.

#### **Research and Development Committee**

In 2019, the NCJW Board of Directors approved a new Strategic Plan that called for the establishment of a standing Research and Development Committee ("R+D") to:

- develop a set of criteria and an ongoing process to research and assess the or creation or adoption of new service projects and/or the establishment of new community partnerships; and
- (2) report relevant findings and make recommendations to the NCJW Board of Directors based on such research and assessment.

This erudite Committee outstandingly chaired by Sara Albert is diligently at work crafting the outline and details of the work needed to be accomplished by this committee.

### Advocacy

### Coordinated by Caren Edelstein our dynamite SPA (State Policy Advocate)

Day on the Hill. At the end March of 12 members of NCJW Dallas journeyed to Austin to join with members from Austin, Houston and San Antonio to hear speakers on NCJW's legislative issues, share ideas and issues, and prepare for legislative visits. This year's legislative concerns included: Protecting Voter Rights and Encouraging Voter Engagement, Funding for Education, and Reproductive Justice. Washington Institute. The triennial NCJW Washington Institute was held this year on Sunday April 7 through April 9, 2019. Eight Dallas NCJW members traveled to join with the other 400 plus attendees to be informed, galvanized by speakers and workshops, and made ready to talk to their legislators when the delegation went to the Capitol. Our Texas delegation visited their individual representatives separately in small groups and the entire delegation met with our Senators. This is truly one of the most invigorating experiences one can have.

### **Community Service**

#### Vice President: Sara Albert

Our engagement in **West Dallas** continues to expand and deepen. We are tutoring in the schools, distributing thousands of uniforms, socks, underwear, hats, scarves, backpacks and school supplies. Thanks to Half Price Books we have also enabled over 5,000 books for the students to take home to continue reading during the summer months. We have provided hundreds of turkeys at Thanksgiving and opened a clothes closet (yeah Stacy Barnett) that has served 420 members of West Dallas families. All these projects and activities have happened because of an amazing cadre of volunteers remarkably led with dedication by Janine Pulman, Deidre Cizon and Judith Broach. **HIPPY** field trips introduce the family (child and parent) to Dallas' cultural offerings so that parents can continue to offer enrichment to their children in a different way. To supplement **HIPPY's** at-home learning, 30 NCJW volunteers made it possible for over 1,600 families to participate in field trips to arts and cultural institutions in Dallas. Research has demonstrated that a single visit to a cultural institution significantly enhances a child's learning capacity for months, and, is particularly significant for children from high-poverty areas.

This year NCJW Dallas awarded 11 college scholarships to former Hippy children who are graduating seniors.

Thanks to Chairs Carol Tobias, Jane Lachman and Chair emeritus Syl Benenson for their tireless commitment to making a difference in the lives of Dallas families.

**Food Fit and Fun** is a bilingual, family centered program that aims to combat obesity before it begins by helping families learn how to live a healthy lifestyle. The program encourages low-income parents to become role models for healthy eating and being physically active. The FFF volunteers have enabled approximately 1750 people to participate in this program. Energetic and dynamic Chairs Robin Zweig, Liz Cooper and Sharan Goldstein make this all happen.

**Eating Well is a Snap** teaches seniors ways to use their food resources in order to maintain good nutrition, which will help them remain active and healthy. Our EWS volunteers, caringly led by Marlene Cohen and Kyra Effren, have engaged with about 615 seniors.

**Kids in Court,** an NCJW initiated and NCJW dependent program, assists children ages 2-18 who must testify as victim-witnesses of felony crimes (generally child abuse and child trafficking) and their non-offending family members successfully deal with the challenges of the traumatic trial process. Each session offers activities, materials and information appropriate for young children, teenagers and both Spanish-speaking and English-speaking adults. This program served about 200 families this year. Chair Judy Hoffman is a champion for the kids in our city.

NCJW is a founding member of the Vickery Meadow Neighborhood Alliance (VMNA) and provides both financial support and volunteers. The **Vickery Meadow Food Pantry and Clothes Closet** is a unique project for NCJW as it shares responsibility for the pantry with several other community groups. This year 1093 households with 4006 members were directly served. Indefatigable Deidre Cizon chairs this project.

The Suitcase Project donates gently used suitcases and tote bags, provides new household items, air mattresses and toiletries to Mosaic Family Services (MFS)for survivors of domestic violence and trafficking. This year our Suitcase volunteers served 26 adults and 22 children.

The passion and commitment of Chairs Sherilyn Bird and Nonie Schwartz help make this a reality.

#### Membership

Chairs Ally Raskin and Amy Schachter-- connectors extraordinaire, with wonderful staff support from Melanie Wisniewski continued to reach out welcoming and involving our new members.

#### Communication

The triennial NCJW Washington Institute was held this year on Sunday April 7 through April 9, 2019. The 400 plus attendees were informed, galvanized by speakers and workshops, and ready to talk to their legislators when the delegation went on the Hill Tuesday.

Cecile Richards, during a thunderous standing ovation was rushed on the stage by a group of women, the entire Texas delegation to be exact. Her speech moved us all and gave us a vision of what could be.

Our hearts were touched as we listened to Alex Wind who survived the shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School and founded March for Our Lives. We were inspired by Former Senator Heidi Heitkamp, Former Attorney General Sally Yates, activist Heather Bloom, and a panel of Israeli directors of leading feminist organizations.

Breakout sessions included unpacking: anti-Semitism, sexism,




white privilege and xenophobia, voter engagement, reproductive justice, immigration and refugees, gun violence prevention, healthcare and workplace equity.

In addition to these areas we spoke to the Senator's staffs about Judicial Nominations (assuring qualified , diverse and fair minded judges).

On Tuesday March 26, 2019 members, Elaine Bernstein, Jayme Cohen, Justin Cohen, Joni Cohan, Laura Diamond, Caren Edelstein, Debbie Greene, Suzi Greenman, Renee Karp, Julie Lowenberg, Joyce Rosenfield, and Elaine Stillman, met with our elected officials in Austin, Texas.

Members from the Austin, Dallas, Houston and San Antonio sections met in Austin to hear speakers on NCJW's legislative issues, share ideas and issues, and prepare for legislative visits. Speakers who helped the group prepare for their visits included: Rabbi Alan Freedman spoke to us about reproductive freedom, former State Representative Paul Colbert gave the group a detailed explanation of school finance, and Beth Stevens, Voting Rights Director from the Texas Civil Rights Project informed the group about voting rights and voter suppression. Ari Conrad from the NCJW National office joined us in Austin for a session on "How to Lobby".

Dinner Monday evening included the presentation of awards. The Texas Trailblazer Award was presented to Rabbi Alan Freedman for his work for reproductive justice. The Belief in Action award was presented to Susan Pintchovski a former Texas SPA and past president of the Austin section for her many years of advocacy work, and State Representative Jessica Farrar from Houston was presented with the Woman Who Dared award for her work in the Texas Legislature.

### Meet OUR NCJW HIPPY 2019 Irving Scholarship Recipients



May 1 was Breakfast With the STARS hosted by the Irving Schools Foundation where we met our 10 scholarship recipients from Irving. What a spectacular group of young women who, after reading 18 Scholarship Applications, we chose the 10 pictured here. We also have one recipient from Richardson ISD. These young women are all working, volunteering, living in underserved communities, are all in AP classes and have college credits in high school toward their college degree. They will be majoring in Nursing, Finance, Marketing to be a sports representative, Communications and Advertising, Corporate Law, Orthodontia, Sports Medicine, Forensic Scientist and Business Consulting. Think about it! All of this came from the foundation that their parents gave them as preschoolers by participating in the HIPPY program.

The Breakfast was quite an event. There were over 900 people-186 scholarship recipients, their parent(s) and their sponsors-all in one room sharing the experience of knowing that they were COLLEGE BOUND. The most exciting part is that, because of an anonymous donor, the Irving Schools Foundation was able to match each scholarship so that every student received at least \$2,000.00 toward college. This may not seem much to some of us but it means a lot to these teens. All together there was over \$500,000 in scholarships awarded that day. The NCJW members who were able to experience this event were Carol Meer, Carol Tobias, Elaine Bernstein, Jackie Fleschman, Joyce Rosenfield and Syl Benenson.

This HIPPY program for 3 and 4 year olds set our recipients on a path for success in school and in life. We know that you cannot build a building by starting on the 3rd floor. You must start at the bottom in order to have the structure and support at the top. HIPPY does just this. By educating from a young age, barriers that might come from the parent's limited education or low income are removed. We are so proud of the parents who saw the value of education and



so proud of these young women who will be our future leaders in years to come!

As the year ends, we are reflecting on the success of our NCJW Dallas Food+Fit=Fun program. The talent and enthusiasm of our twelve volunteers made interacting with our students so eager to learn a healthier lifestyle fun. During our twenty-four lessons, they had the opportunity to ask questions, learn how to read nutrition labels and measure serving size portions. They danced Zumba and were introduced to the dangers of overindulging in sugar and salt.
