President's Perspective



Joyce Rosenfield

July 7, 2017, the first anniversary of the ambush of Dallas Police officers in downtown Dallas; another unarmed African American teen killed by a white police officer; the 40-year-old yoga instructor who called for help for a neighbor killed by a police officer who came to assist; 10 more "human beings" died trying to come to America looking for, as Jacqueliynn Floyd stated

in her DMN column, "a hard, physically demanding job and a few bucks to send back home" ...reliving the pain, the heartache, the memories. What has happened to humanity in America? What kind of progress has been made on gun control, race relations, hatred and bigotry, mental health, anti-Semitism in the schools and on social media, immigration, and health care?

It can be very frustrating to get answers to the above questions. Yes, some can say the failure of the new Health Care reform bill and the easing up of the ban on immigrants coming in from the seven Middle Eastern countries were positive changes. But what can we say about the rest of our concerns that affect the lives of women, children and families and what will it take to make the necessary changes to keep the great America that we know?

Vivian Castleberry, a writer in Dallas and a former longtime women's editor for the *Dallas Times Herald*, wrote an Op-Ed in *The Dallas Morning News* titled "Women must cooperate across the political divide. Liberals and conservatives reach greatest success when working together". She recognized NCJW Dallas as an organization that does that. Yes, we have liberals as well as conservatives in NCJW, but it has never stopped us from making progress toward our initiatives.

Consider what has been accomplished over the hot summer months:

Sponsored by NCJW, Inc. over 40 NCJW Dallas members and community participants at large participated in a full day community organizing training, led by JOIN for Justice. An eye opener for many, the workshop offered valuable training in how to make a difference. As a next step, we are hosting an Advocacy and Voter Registrar Training on September 6th. We will be working to educate our community about the importance of getting out the vote.

NCJW volunteers continued to assist with "Know Your Rights" presentations and "Family Preparedness" Workshops, helping immigrant families learn how to protect themselves and their families in this very challenging environment.

Through NCJW's new "Suitcase Project", NCJW volunteers provided necessities to help settle three domestic violence/human trafficking victims and their children into their new transitional housing apartments.

A thirty plus group of NCJW volunteers with The "West Dallas Clothes Closet & Back to School Initiative" arranged for 500 backpacks and notebooks to be given to students who attended the August 19th West Dallas Community Center Back to School Fair, and for 600 uniforms to be distributed to K-2 students in six West Dallas

elementary schools so they can all return to school with dignity and improved self-esteem.

Plans are underway for a Volunteer Fair, in conjunction with our September 26th Opening Meeting, which will feature Liz Cedilla Pereira, the first Director of the City of Dallas' newly established Office of Welcoming Communities and Immigrant Affairs. You will be able to sign up for projects that afford you opportunities to make new friends, contribute your expertise, and make a difference in our community.

The Awards Committee has chosen incredibly deserving awardees for our NCJW awards and continues to work on nominating NCJW members for community awards. The Pioneering Partner award will be given to the Dallas Women's Foundation. Roslyn Dawson-Thompson, President and CEO, said that she was "teary eyed and dancing down the hall" to hear that they had been selected.

The 105th Birthday Luncheon Committee has been hard at work to reach its goal of raising \$375,000 to support our work in the coming year. It will take each of us helping support the luncheon in some manner to make it happen. We can do it!

Our work will continue throughout the year. As NCJW members and supporters, I know that you will find your individual way(s) to help NCJW continue its mission to improve the quality of life of women, children and families in our great community.

NCJW Dallas members, community leaders from the Dallas area from both Jewish and non-Jewish advocacy organizations came together for a full day of training on Sunday June 25, 2017. The program presented by JOIN (Jewish Organizing Institute & Network) for Justice trained participants to lead campaigns to address issues important to their organizations.

Participants learned the difference between problems and issues, understanding relationships, how to build effective relationships for organizing, and a framework for thinking about power. Participants also began to explore dynamics of privilege and oppression and how to work across lines of difference, as well as possible campaigns to address issues particular to Dallas and Texas.

The room was energized at the end of this daylong session and ready to start a campaign to make a difference. NCJW Greater Dallas will be asking you to join us to advocate and take part in a campaign coming to you soon.

Community Service



Obesity rates for children have more than doubled over the last 30 years and have quadrupled for adolescents. This is the first generation of children who are likely to live shorter lives than their parents. Today, more than 35 percent of adults are considered obese, and obesity is one of the main causes of preventable diseases.

Food+Fit=Fun (FFF) was created by NCJW, Greater Dallas Section, as a fun, family- centered experience to help combat food insecurity and obesity before they begin. It is a bi-lingual, hands-on nutrition and wellness program that provides ways to live a healthier life by eating well, staying active, and having fun.

NCJW is part of the Dallas Area Coalition for the Prevention of Childhood Obesity. Through this coalition, FFF was able to develop a relationship with the UT Southwestern Clinical Nutrition Program led by Dr. JoAnn Carson, who facilitated a comprehensive evaluation of our program. Graduate students Laura Havard and Lauren Wonderly in the Department of Clinical Nutrition evaluated the effectiveness of the FFF program based on the self-reported behavior changes of over 600 participants in three specific categories: food consumption, food shopping, and physical activity. We are pleased to report that in each category participants showed statistically significant improvement.

In order to bring this program to more families, FFF needs your help. We are seeking volunteers with community outreach skills and computer skills! Other volunteer opportunities include teaching FFF's healthy eating curriculum to participants of many different cultures, facilitating fun exercise demonstrations, and leading grocery store tours.

What is HIPPY from the ISD perspective?

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters, is a three year, ninety week home-based early childhood literacy program for 3, 4 and 5 year olds. Home Instructors from Dallas, Irving and Richardson ISDs visit assigned families in their homes every week to support and empower those parents in their critical role as their child's first and most important teacher. During these visits the Home Instructors teach **parents** a carefully developed curriculum with books and materials designed to strengthen their child's cognitive skills, early literacy skills, social/emotional and physical development. In turn, parents then teach their child the curriculum for that week. Parents and children learn together and their bond is strengthened; children attain readiness skills for success in school, parents are motivated to continue academic support of their children, and many parents further their own education. The goal is to CLOSE THE ACHIEVEMENT GAP.

What is HIPPY from the NCJW perspective?

NCJW volunteers escort groups of parents with their children through the Perot Museum of Nature and Science and the Children's Adventure Garden at the Dallas Arboretum. In addition, we join with the staff at the Dallas Museum of Art to accompany the families through an adventure on how to enjoy an art museum. We are with the families for about 2 hours on each museum visit, introducing them to venues that most have never visited. It's exciting to see the faces when a child sees dinosaurs or watches a bee pollinate a flower for the first time.

HIPPY needs volunteers.

Because the school districts are increasing the number of HIPPY families enrolled in the program, we need more volunteers. There are about 1,500 families in the HIPPY program. You will be trained. Your role could be to accompany a trained volunteer or you can take a more active part and lead the tours. However you choose to participate, you will be an integral part of the program and a role-model just by your interaction with these families.

You will be receiving in the mail and email the schedule of FIELD TRIPS for the 2017-2018 school year. By participating you will become part of NCJW's largest program. Join the fun and get involved in a program that can be life changing for these families. You will also get to know some wonderful NCJW women along the way.

WACHS: Making Strides to Help Those in Need

Women's Access to Comprehensive Health Services (WACHS) is making great plans for the 2017-2018 year. We will continue offering classes to a variety of organizations. Recipient agencies have the ability to choose from any of the four classes available: Healthy Relationships; Good Decision Making; Financial Literacy; and Mindfulness as a Stress Reduction Technique. For the financial literacy component, NCJW hopes to partner with Frost Bank which has a division specifically for this purpose. This program involves having at least four NCJW volunteers for each class: an English speaker, a fluent-Spanish speaker, and two more volunteers to watch children while their mothers attend the classes. Four classes are offered each semester.

HIGHLIGHTING NCJW COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

Don't be surprised if you are attending a local conference and see a NCJW table! Under the leadership of Pamela Reiter, WACHS will be exhibiting to highlight NCJW programming. Not only will information regarding classes be available, but tables will also have information regarding all NCJW Dallas Community Service projects. Additionally, wallet cards will be provided; wallet cards offer organization names and contact information as a resource list of those who can best meet the needs of women and children.

THE SUITCASE PROJECT

WACHS is very excited to have initiated The Suitcase Project in the Dallas area. It goes without saying that neither women nor children should be leaving ANY place with their belongings in a trash bag; yet, when people have to leave dangerous situations at a moment's notice, this is often what occurs. Working with Mosaic, a shelter for women who have experienced abuse or have been trafficked, NCJW volunteers will help provide the basics for these women and children to help them begin a safe new life. Upon entering the shelter, they will receive tote bags filled with personal care items, robes & flip flops, and those women and children moving into transitional housing apartments will be given the basic household items to start their lives anew. Your donated gently used tote bags and suitcases on wheels will help transport their belongings and symbolize a new beginning.
