As members of NCJW community it is incumbent upon us to learn what is being done to combat domestic violence, better understand the role gun violence plays, and what we can do about it. We have invited the following eminent members of our community for a panel discussion of what is happening in Dallas.

- **Jan Langbein, CEO at Genesis Women’s Shelter & Support and Austin Street Center,**
- **Councilmember, Jennifer Staubach Gates, Councilmember City Council District 13, who heads the City of Dallas’ Domestic Violence Task Force,**
- **Judge Roberto Canas who serves in one of the County’s Domestic Violence Courts and who has been named as a mentor court by the US Dept of Justice**

Moderated by Natalie Nanasi, Assistant Professor, Director, of the Judge Elmo B. Hunter Legal Center for Victims of Crimes Against Women, SMU Dedman School of Law.

Domestic violence affects millions of women across the country, and guns in the hands of domestic abusers can turn abuse into murder. Indeed, the presence of a gun in a domestic violence situation makes it five times more likely that the woman will be killed.

Common sense laws that keep guns out of the hands of domestic abusers—by requiring background checks for all gun sales and ensuring that prohibited abusers relinquish guns in their possession—just make sense. And for victims of domestic abuse, it’s a matter of life and death.

Guns and domestic violence are a deadly—and all too common—combination. (Everytown for Gun Safety)

According to the Dallas Domestic Violence Task Force, here in Dallas, The Gun Surrender Program seeks to confiscate guns per statutory requirements from persons convicted of domestic violence charges; it is the first of its kind and one of the few in existence nationally. Yet this program needs more active participation and referrals from judges to ensure victim safety. The identification of repeat and dangerous offenders and the removal of guns must remain top priorities. “The City must continue to be mindful of the role of abusers’ gun ownership, and the courts must find ways to share information to assist in targeting repeat offenders.”

Introducing Korina J. Smith, Our New Executive Director



Multi-talented Korina J. Smith is a woman in total sync with the work and values of NCJW. She always had a passion for, as she puts it, “helping people escape poverty.” She remembers thinking, as a child observing the poverty in her community, “Why doesn’t every farmer just donate a cow somewhere?” That same child was equally passionate about human rights. At age 10, Smith begged her parents to take her to see Schindler’s

List. She wanted to know more about the Holocaust and to put her energy behind “Never Again”. Walk into her office and you’ll always find a bowl of oranges on her conference table. That’s because when she read Dave Eggers’ book on the Sudanese lost boys; what struck her was that one of them fantasized about eating an orange.

Smith also brings to NCJW her deep experience in both the business and non-profit worlds. In 2015, she launched the Dallas chapter of Global Chamber, an organization, headquartered in Phoenix AZ that connects local leaders with the international business community. Before that, she served as regional director of College Admissions Assistance where she helped students navigate the entire starting-college experience, including finding financial aid, getting registered for classes, and settling into the school routine. She did similar work for Humanitarian Travels International and Airline Ambassadors International.

Now, our NCJW executive director in Dallas, she plans to focus on several things. “Suzi is irreplaceable so is simply passing the baton. I definitely want to continue the section’s current work and the section’s legacy,” she says. “But it is also important to continue to bring in younger members to learn from current leaders and prepare them to take leadership positions.”

All of that makes for a pretty full plate, but Smith does find time for fun. She loves to host game nights with friends (charades is a favorite), to practice yoga at Klyde Warren Park, and to bicycle on the Katy Trail with her blind dog in her bicycle basket. Drop in on her for a visit. She’s happy to talk to you, and not just in English but also French, Spanish, Portuguese, and a bit of Swahili.

Reading is a survival tool. We know that children who are not reading by the third grade are more likely to drop out of school. Martinez Learning Center, one of the West Dallas schools that NCJW is working with, will embark on a tutoring program with our volunteers this fall. Their goal is to improve fluency, expand vocabulary, and have all students reading at grade level by 3rd grade.

The plan is to pair readers in first and second grade with a reading buddy, (think NCJW member) who can also serve as a mentor. The reading buddy will not only work with the students to improve skills, but also provide a willing listening ear.

Classroom teachers will assign appropriate reading level materials and guidance. Reading buddies will be trained before they meet with their students. Martinez Learning Center staff will work with NCJW in early fall to set-up times for buddy training.

Community Service

WEST DALLAS – Off to a GREAT Start

The West Dallas Project began as a way to help fulfill the needs of economically disadvantaged students in 6 elementary schools in DISD. NCJW volunteers listened to the professionals in the schools and at the West Dallas Multipurpose Center and recognized we could best fulfill the students' needs by providing some basics: uniforms, undies, backpacks & binders, and reading mentors. Last year we helped and started the Giggly Girls Reading Club with Hockaday 5th graders at Stephens Park Elementary School and it is our hope to expand this program. This fall we begin the adult reading mentor program at the Martinez Learning Center. In the meantime throughout the summer, volunteers have been active and purchased, sorted, and delivered 2221 uniforms, donated books and games, and were trained to become reading mentors. After we meet with the principals this fall, we will see if NCJW can assist the schools in additional ways.

At the West Dallas Multipurpose Center (WDMC) annual Back to School Fair, we distributed 550 backpacks and binders, plus key chains thanks to Jay Zopolsky. WDMC requested a kids clothes closet, with after school clothes at the Center. In August NCJW opened the NCJW Kids Clothes Closet at the WDMC and assisted over 20 families in the first two weeks. Please keep the gently used, clean clothes coming in – we want to be able to stay open throughout the year.

In 2018, NCJW will again provide turkeys (300) at Thanksgiving in partnership with the West Dallas Multipurpose Center.
