

The theme for my presidency is "Expanding Our Reach, Increasing Our Impact "The underserved in our city have so many needs. We at NCJW have to ability to make a sizeable dent in those needs. We have processes in place to critically evaluate how we expand our reach and increase our impact to meet those needs.

Our first president was Grace Goldstein. In 1913 she faced many challenges. Our challenges today are different, but no less daunting. After a tornado destroyed our office and a pandemic shut us down, we got up dusted ourselves off and pushed on. I am hopeful that in the near future we will be able to all be together to show off are new modern office. Electronics , technology, and the internet have enabled us to keep working and staying in touch. We have had many virtual meetings, including a zoom installation.

Our community service project leaders continue to think outside the box in order to deliver our much-needed services. The needs of the underserved in our community do not go away because of a pandemic they only increase. To meet some of those needs, Carol Weinstein, chair of our SHARE Endowment fund asked the committee to approve a COVID emergency fund to be distributed to partner agencies. The committee decided to allocate \$100,000.00 from the SHARE Endowment Fund to help mitigate the virus' impact on those agencies. Through a grant process the funds were distributed to ten partner agencies in July. The agencies are:

Attitudes and Attire, Dallas CASA, Feed Oak Cliff, Jewish Family Service of Greater Dallas, Literacy Achieves, Mosaic Family Services,

Inc, Our Friends Place, Planned Parenthood of Greater Texas, Texas Muslim Women's Foundation. VNA Meals on Wheels. The services performed by these agencies directly impact the lives of women, children and families in the Greater Dallas area. That is why we are here and that is why we do what we do.

Our advocacy committee is working at full speed making sure our seniors can vote by mail and reminding everyone of the importance of the upcoming election.

Our fundraising Vice Presidents have been working to make sure our 108th Birthday Luncheon will be as if not more successful than past luncheons. Save the date January 21,2021. Hopefully it will be in person; if not we have a plan B.

Our Vice presidents of public affairs have been busy planning our upcoming programs. The first is our Opening Meeting for September 24,2020. (details to follow)

There are so many issues affecting our lives today that require actions and change. NCJW has always been at the forefront to find solutions for change. To accomplish significate, change for the populations we serve and the greater community, we need to change the governmental processes and laws that effect those populations. We need to be strong advocates for laws that protect the rights of women families and children. We need to advocate for policing policies that protect the lives of the Black community. NCJW Advocacy Hard at Work

We have an organized advocacy team that will be assisting with voter registration and getting out the vote activities for the fall elections.

This Committee has been hard at work fulfilling the need to help 65+ individuals in assisted living and independent living residences to register and to vote by mail. We have collaborated with Senior Source to reach out to the facilities that they were nice enough to identify for us. We are contacting the key staff in these retirement residences asking for their assistance in distributing the packets of information that will enable the residents to vote.

I think this quote sums up our 2019-20 year and National Council of Jewish Women Dallas Section!

On October 20, our Royal Lane office was destroyed in the Tornado, along with the homes of many of our members. Temple Emanu-El generously took in these refuges. In February we moved into our new offices, 16910 Dallas Parkway #104, Dallas, TX 75248, and in mid-March we shut down for a Pandemic! One of my favorite expressions, that I am sure my family is tired of hearing, is "Man plans, and God laughs!"

Despite all of this, and with the help of our amazing members we are as strong as ever. Some highlights of our year below.

Administration—Vice President Carol Alkek

PACE Committee Chairs: Ann Bogdanow and Macki Ellenbogen

The PACE Committee, thru diligent evaluation and review, recommended the total NCJW allocation for 2020-21 be \$ 162,500. The PACE Committee further unanimously recommended to the board that our Community Service projects receive the following financial allocations for the 2020-21 fiscal year:

• West Dallas Initiative: \$ 74,450

HIPPY Field Trips and Scholarships: \$ 33,800

Food + Fit = Fun and Eating Well is a SNAP: \$ 32,800

Kids in Court: \$ 4,000

The Suitcase Project: \$ 15,600

These project requests totaled \$160,650. The PACE Committee unanimously recommended that we keep the remaining \$ 1,850 in the bank to be used in an emergency situation.

The PACE Committee also unanimously recommended that volunteer requests from all Community Service projects including the agency requests from Literacy Achieves and Kosher Home Delivered Meals be approved.

As of January 2020, project leaders reported a total of 1536 hours given by NCJW Dallas volunteers. This figure does not include all the West Dallas hours. And of course, these numbers are lower than we would expect as we had no Spring Projects due to the Pandemic! Thank you to 2020-21 PACE Chairs Ann Bogdanow and Macki Ellenbogen , and the PACE Committee for a job so well done! Thanks to Donna Kun, Kim Schonwald and Elaine Stillman for shepherding and figuring our available funds and to Melanie, Natalie and Nicole for their support.

The Nominating Committee, so very ably chaired by Joyce Rosenfield, worked steadfastly presenting the NCJW Dallas Section a stellar slate for the coming year.

Public Affairs

Under the direction of our V.P.'s our Public Affairs Program has enabled education and actively demonstrated commitment to our engagement in our community.

Our Opening Meeting was a well-attended huge success. We were promised a light lunch, but thanks to our volunteers, it was more than light, it was beautiful and delicious. The lunch was followed by and insightful program titled "A Woman's Right." It was facilitated by Sonja Miller, Outreach and Faith Director for the for the Texas Freedom Network and Reverend Erika Wilson, Outreach and Coordinator for the Texas Freedom Network. No subject was taboo as members addressed a multitude of issues including shame, abortion, and the political environment affecting women's health issues. Thank you to Sara Albert, Caren Edelstein, Hadassah Yuster and staff, Melanie, Nicole, and Alex.

Annual Report

We continued with a Study Group on Women's emotions and Reproductive Choices. An enlightening and wonderfully led presentation and discussion by Rabbi Shira Wallach of Congregation Shearth Israel. Shira's presentation gave us the Jewish historical perspective and these choices and their impact.

Our Winter Meeting, Women at the Ballot Box, addressed the issue that the 2020 elections are going to be the most consequential elections in the history of women's rights, starting with the importance of voting in the primaries. Wherever your beliefs lie and whatever precinct you live in, NCJW Dallas is committed to provide information to help you wade through the issues.

Two amazing speakers: Award-winning author and longtime WSJ editor and Dallas Bureau Chief, **Karen Blumenthal**, of blessed memory, gave an insightful and riveting overview of her book "Jane Against the World: Roe v. Wade and the Fight for Reproductive Rights", which details the history of the fight for reproductive rights in the U.S. and how it has affected women's choices over decades.

And **NCJW** Legislative Associate **SHANNON RUSSELL** who leads federal advocacy on reproductive health, rights, and justice, provided the historical framework of NCJW's role in the ongoing battle for women's reproductive rights.

Research and Development Committee

Chair: Sara Albert

In 2019, the NCJW Board of Directors approved a new Strategic Plan that called for the establishment of a standing Research and Development Committee ("R+D") to:

- (1) develop a set of criteria and an ongoing process to research and assess the or creation or adoption of new service projects and/ or the establishment of new community partnerships; and
- (2) report relevant findings and make recommendations to the NCJW Board of Directors based on such research and assessment.

This erudite Committee has created a new project submission form and a new project evaluation rubric.

Community Service

Vice President: Debbie Greene

Kosher Home Delivered Meals (formerly Kosher Meals on Wheels) Chair: Bonnie Grossfeld

NCJW volunteers drive a route MWF, 4 times a year (March, June, August, October) to deliver meals to homebound residents. JFS serves about 40+ clients with this service. There are 4 regular volunteers, but the project could use a few more, particularly a couple who would agree to serve as substitutes.

Suitcase Project

Chairs: Nonie Schwartz, Sherilyn Bird

NCJW provides "starter kits" for women and children moving out of Mosaic into safe apartments. We average about 5 starter kits a month, although with COVID-19, residents are staying in the shelter longer than usual right now. The Shelter Director indicates that they will have a larger than usual number of women and children moving out of the shelter in the next month or so.

There are 12-14 regular volunteers who shop for the starter kits, usually at Walmart. They tend to work in pairs. The project could use a few more volunteers but it's not crucial right now. Because there have been changes in program due to COVID-19. Volunteers are not shopping for supplies right now. The Chairs are placing orders for supplies online and are either having them delivered directly to Mosaic's offices, delivered to the nearest store to be picked up and delivered by the chairs or delivered to the Chairs' homes and delivered by them. Due to COVID-19, NCJW has also been providing masks (paper and fabric) and thermometer covers since May.

HIPPY (Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youth) Chairs: Syl Benenson, Carol Tobias, Jane Lachman

There are currently about 1500 families participating in HIPPY: Dallas ISD (700-800), Irving ISD (600) and Richardson ISD (50-75). Irving ISD wants to grow their program to serve more families.

Fall of 2019 there were 6 scheduled trips; December was cancelled because of the weather. There were five field trips October and November

39 volunteers @ 4 hours for each volunteer to total 156 volunteer hours; 406 HIPPY parents; 407 kids; 34 ISD staff.

January and February (everything after that was cancelled) 7 Field trips; 37 Volunteers @ 4 hours=148 hours;

563 HIPPY parents; 505 kids; 44 ISD staff.

We did have over 30 graduating seniors who applied for our HIPPY scholarships and we were able to give 10.

Right now, because of COVID-19, school districts are in a waitand-see mode right now. Dallas ISD is leaning towards virtual field trips, virtual HIPPY visits, and virtual library activities all in English and Spanish. Irving ISD is thinking about having field trips but with much smaller groups. Virtual activities won't begin before October. Perot, the Arboretum, and the DMA are currently working with HIPPY chairs to develop a virtual/at home curriculum if in-person field trips prove to be impossible.

West Dallas Initiative

Volunteers distribute school uniforms, socks, underwear, shoes, and jackets, as well as backpacks and school supplies at a community Back to School Fair. Turkeys are distributed before Thanksgiving. A tutoring program has been implemented at Eladio Martinez Elementary School. NCJW volunteers also help Pinkston High School Collegiate Academy find jobs for internships.

This year

- At the WDMC Back to School Fair we distributed 550 backpacks & binders.
- 5000 uniforms were distributed among our five adopted schools
- 675 currently served at Clothes Closet,
- 3,600 books (Half Price Books) distributed as "incentive gifts."
- 350 hats/scarf sets (Legacy Willow Bend knitters),
- 120 jackets
- 450 turkeys (approximately 900 people) WDMC,

- 15 Martinez reading partners.
- (expecting 8,845 people served next year).

Vickery Meadows Chair: Deidra Cizon

Vickery Meadows is currently a Covid19 hot spot. The Food Pantry is serving more than twice the number of clients since the pandemic began—around 80-90 families a day. We provide volunteers along with other organizations. Carol Weinstein heads the volunteers from 1-4:00pm on Mondays. Deidra Cizon heads the volunteers from 9am-12:00 noon on Wednesdays.

Normally, clients come into the pantry, register on the computer, socialize a bit, and make their choices from the Food Pantry. Since the pandemic began the Food Pantry has switched to low-contact, drive-through delivery. Several churches as well as Temple Emanu-El are storing perishables for the Food Pantry.

Food + Fit = Fun

Chairs: Robin Zweig, Liz Cooper, Sharan Goldstein

In 2019-2020 FFF served families at all three Literacy Achieves locations, Jewish Family Services, Mosaic Women's Shelter, and Irving I.S.D. HIPPY. FFF provides English and Spanish manuals for participants. These manuals stress nutrition and exercise. They include games for children and a recipe section. FFF also has an Instructors' manual with tips on how to teach each lesson. Each participant completes an intake questionnaire as well as an evaluation at the end of the units.

Robin will be ordering exercise bands with NCJW and FFF logos to give to participants and to send to NCJW sections, along with an online version of the manuals and brochures, who have expressed interested in establishing FFF in their sections.

Eating Well is a SNAP! Chair: Marlene Cohen

Purpose: Under the umbrella of Food + Fit = Fun, this program is geared towards lower income senior adults. EWS! is an interactive, bilingual program that provides information on eating well on a limited budget, food resources, and senior services.

EWS! is a component of the Dallas Coalition for Hunger Solutions. Because of COVID-19 classes have been suspended since the beginning of the pandemic. Marlene ordered and delivered cases of water and healthy snacks to one of the underserved senior housing units in Northeast Dallas.

Kids In Court

CHAIR: Judy Hoffman

Judy is working on completing an Administrator's Guide to Kids in Court that will help Court professionals become familiar with Kids in Court whenever there are new hires or changeovers in the District Attorney's office. The guide will also be sent to other communities who want to start their own Kids in Court programs. The Guide will include an explanation of the program, samples of materials, matrices of responsibilities, a syllabus for each session, timelines, as well as NCJW and Dallas District Attorney guidelines.

With the help of a Hillcrest Foundation grant, Judy planned and implemented production of an orientation video for teen participants this year. A video already existed for younger children. The Kids in Court program and the videos will be featured at the Crimes Against Children conference currently scheduled for August 2020. Kids in Court was the recipient of the Community Council of Greater Dallas Impact Award this past year!

There are currently about 10 regular volunteers. Usually between 4-6 volunteers are needed for each session. Currently, because of

COVID-19, the Dallas County Courts are closed.

Membership

NCJW Nominees Honored with Community Awards

The NCJW Greater Dallas Section Awards Committee is proud to announce that several of our nominees were selected to receive prestigious community awards in 2020:

Lois Finkelman was honored by the League of Women Voters of Dallas with its Susan B. Anthony Award at a luncheon in February. The award is presented annually to a person who exemplifies Susan B. Anthony's characteristics of independence, persistence, determination, and dedication in obtaining equal rights for all.

As a Dallas City Councilwoman for three terms and its first woman Park Board Chair, Lois is more than qualified for this award. However, she has given of her time and talent in many other ways. As chair of the Dallas Zoo Management Board, she led the zoo's transition from a City managed facility to a private entity and is the incoming chair of the Dallas Zoological Society, the organization which now manages the zoo. Lois' inspiring leadership, amazing energy and commitment have enhanced the Dallas and North Texas region as a healthy and environmentally responsible place to live. Also a long time NCJW volunteer, Lois is a past Co-Chair with Lynda Newman of the NCJW PACE Committee and has served on NCJW's R&D Committee as well as many other NCJW committees.

Another long time NCJW Dallas volunteer, **Terry Greenberg** received a Profile In Leadership Award at the SMU Women's Symposium on March 6. These awards celebrate the accomplishments of women who have made a significant impact on the city of Dallas and on the quality of life for women overall. An attorney who left the full time practice of labor law to follow her passion, Terry is the founder and executive director of the North Texas Alliance To Reduce Teen Pregnancy (NTARUPT), the only organization in this area committed to providing teens with the sex education they need in order to have healthy relationships.

Among other services, NTARUPT and its delivery partners offer evidence-based, medically accurate sexuality education to parents and teens and links clients to youth-friendly healthcare. Terry's involvement as a volunteer with WACHS (Women's Access to Comprehensive Health Services), a former NCJW Dallas initiative, sparked her commitment to reducing teen pregnancy and ultimately to founding NTARUPT.

Kathleen LaValle, the CEO and President of Dallas CASA, which is a community partner of NCJW, was recognized with a Maura "Women Helping Women" Award by the Texas Women's Foundation. A former board member and chair of Dallas CASA, (Court Appointed Special Advocates), Kathleen became its president and CEO in 2014, leaving a distinguished legal practice to follow her passion for CASA's mission to advocate for the best interest of abused and neglected children, helping them gain safe, permanent homes. The agency, originally called FOCAS (Foster Child Advocate Services), was founded by NCJW Greater Dallas Section in 1980, and it has maintained a close relationship with NCJW for over 40 years.

Today Kathleen leads the largest CASA program in the country in terms of total children served by volunteers, number of volunteer advocates, and annual revenue, with 83 percent of the volunteers being women. In 2019, Dallas CASA and its nearly 1,500 volunteer advocates served more than 3,500 children in foster care. Now advocating for 98% of Dallas County children in foster care, Dallas CASA's goal is to serve every child in need.

2020 TEXAS VOTING: DO'S and DON'TS:

Here are some basic do's and don'ts about Texas voting to guide your decisions about how you will vote:ote:

VOTER REGISTRATION

✓ Deadline for Registering: 10/5/2020. Go to votetexas.gov to find if you are already registered or out how to register.

MAIL-IN VOTING QUALIFICATIONS

- ✓ There are ONLY 4 qualifying reasons for a Mail-In Ballot in Texas:

 1) Age: 65+; 2) Disability; 3) Out of County; 4) Jail.

TEXAS VOTE BY MAIL PROCESS:

- If you are 65 or over, the mail-in application will be mailed to you automatically.

- ✓ You can return the ballot by mail at a post office or mailbox OR
- You can deliver it to county administrator's office in person with approved voter ID.
- ✓ The Dallas County Elections Department is at 1520 Roundtable Drive, Dallas, TX. 75247. They will have a number to call to arrange a curbside drop-off, but the number is not available yet.
- Go to usvotefoundation.org to find your elections office if you do not reside in Dallas County.

ballot has been received. Go to sos.texas.gov for the number.

- You cannot drop your mail-in ballot off at your polling place. You can surrender your mail-in ballot at your polling place and then yote in person.
- If you applied for a mail-in ballot and never received it, you can cast a provisional vote at your polling place.
- Mail-in ballots must be received by Election Day OR be postmarked by 7pm on Election Day and delivered by 5pm the following day.
- Mail-in ballots will be counted beginning on Election Day in jurisdictions with 100,000 or fewer voters; counting can begin at the close of early in-person voting in larger jurisdictions.

IN-PERSON EARLY VOTING

- ✓ Early voting begins on 10/13/2020.
- You can vote at ANY early voting location in your county. Go to votetexas.gov to find your county's early voting location.
- Consider going to a non-central early voting location in 'off-hours' to limit your COVID exposure.

ELECTION DAY VOTING: 11/3/20

- ✓ You can vote at your precinct and you MUST bring approved ID.
- If your county participates in the Countywide Polling Place Program, you may also have the option of voting at any polling place county-wide.
